The Spring term is already moving swiftly by, and there is a real sense of focus and purpose across the school.

Year 6 pupils are now very much concentrating on their end-of-year SATs. Their attitude to learning has been excellent, and they are showing real determination and resilience as they prepare for this important stage of their primary journey.

This week, we carried out an English book look, and it was a pleasure to see the fabulous work in pupils' books. There is clear evidence of excellent progress made by individual pupils, as well as strong progression from year to year. As part of this review, we have also asked some reflective questions of ourselves around handwriting — specifically how we can ensure pupils become confident and fluent with cursive handwriting as early as possible, so that the physical act of writing does not hold them back in expressing their ideas.

I have also had the opportunity to meet with and give a tour of the school to your newly elected Parent Governors. It was a pleasure to share the work of the school with them, and I hope they will enjoy becoming involved in, and seeing first-hand, the strategic work that takes place behind the scenes over the coming terms.

Our Kenningtons Experience continues to enrich learning across the school. Year 2 visited Charterhouse to support their history learning, Reception experienced life-size dinosaurs during their Teach Rex dinosaur workshop, bringing dinosaurs to life in an exciting and memorable way and Year 5 attended Young Voices at the O2. I was fortunate enough to attend with the pupils and can honestly say they had the time of their lives. It was a privilege to see the joy on their faces. A special thank you must go to the staff who gave up their evening and family time to make this unforgettable experience possible for the children.

Over the past few weeks, Mrs Clarke and I have been working closely on our history and geography curriculum. We have refined how historical and geographical skills are presented to pupils and revisited all lessons to ensure they are of the highest quality. Some lessons have been modified and additional lessons added where needed. We look forward to sharing these developments with staff after half term.

Finally, thank you for your calm and supportive response to the incident that occurred in the surrounding area last week. If I receive any further updates from the police, I will share these with you. In the meantime, please continue to remain vigilant to help ensure the safety of all children.

Merit Awards




The merit system has been designed to encourage, reward and promote exemplary work and good behaviour. It has also been designed to give recognition to pupils who make a positive contribution to the school that may otherwise go unnoticed. Not only do the merits reward hard work and effort, they also aim to recognise the pupils who are making positive steps to become model citizens in the future.

Number of Merits required to achieve each level:

Bronze = 50 merits (bronze certificate and bronze badge)

Silver = 60 merits (silver certificate and silver badge)

Gold = 75 merits (gold certificate, gold badge and a special trip reward)
